Connecting Country's Landcare Facilitator supports around 30 Landcare and Friends groups in the Mount Alexander region by:


- > Providing networking and training opportunities like the Landcare Link-ups

Since 2010, Connecting Country has worked with a diversity of private landholders, assisting them with habitat restoration projects on their properties.

To date we have helped restore more than 9500 Ha in the Mount Alexander region, through:

- > Revegetation and promoting natural regeneration
- > Protective fencing for significant vegetation
- > Control of invasive plants and animals
- > Technical advice and management plans
- > Conservation covenants to protect areas of high conservation status.
