




President's Message

You'll be hearing more about this as 2025-26 unfolds. We'll need to use our voices more strongly in advocating for critical investment and work hard to build new partnerships.

Director's Message

The 2024-25 year has brought with it a roller coaster of highs and lows for Connecting Country. We were successful in a small number of significant government grants, which, alongside continued support from key philanthropic donors, has supported us to deliver some interesting and engaging projects throughout the year.

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A key focus has been on the delivery of our Partnerships Against Pests project supported by the Victorian Government, aimed at raising awareness and landholder capacity to manage established pests. We offered a range of training opportunities, field days and market stalls for community alongside a media campaign. All activities were fully booked which indicates not only a need for this type of education but also a desire from landholders seeking to do the best they can in managing their land in this region.

Sadly during the past year, we have said goodbye to some fantastic staff; Hadley, Anna and Ivan. As they move on to new adventures, financial limitations have meant that we have not been able to replace them (not that they're easily replaceable) and as such, we are now down to a small team of two part time staff. I acknowledge and thank Bonnie for her long-term dedication to the organisation now going on 15 years and her flexibility through various fluctuations over this time. Bonnie's ecological expertise, local restoration experience and relationships with landholders are some of our most important and invaluable assets.

Whilst the retraction of staff has been difficult, it has offered me the opportunity to meet and work much more closely with our partners, particularly Landcare and Friends Groups. I am constantly in awe of all the amazing contributions happening across the region in protecting biodiversity and helping build the resilience in the landscape we so desperately need for the future. Keep up the great work!

"A highlight for me during 2024-25 was hosting the Feathery Festival in partnership with Barkers Creek Landcare & Wildlife Group and Birdlife Castlemaine District.

The Festival aimed to raise awareness of local woodland birds through a series of events centred around National Threatened Species Day in September 2024.

Finance Report

The ongoing challenging financial environment for Not-for-profit organisations continued to put pressure on Connecting Country in 2024-25. Early budgeting indicated income was likely to be significantly lower during the year and as such, Connecting Country took proactive action to reduce expenditure, largely via a reduction in staffing levels, to avoid significant financial implications to the organisation. Through careful management, we were able to record a small financial surplus with Income \$337,374, Expenses \$332,135 and a Surplus of \$5,239 despite a reduction in net income of over \$100K from 2023-24.

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A note worthy feature was the increasing level of generosity we continue to receive each year from donors. In 2022-23, Donations were \$14,648, in 2023-24 \$19,681 and in 2024-25 \$32,438. The ongoing, and increasing support from our donors is welcome and we see it as encouragement and appreciation for the work we perform.

Our Net Assets are \$157,858 (\$152,619 in 2023-24), mainly in cash reserves.

As reported by many other Not-for-profit organisations, philanthropic funding is less readily available. In 2023-24, this represented 31% of our income, in 2024-25 it was 16.5%. Fee for service represented 18% of our income whilst government income was 46.5%, in line with the previous year.


Our financial performance continues to be closely monitored with regular updating of our budget, monthly comparison of actual performance against budget and an annual audit by a qualified auditor.

Given the decline in funding available from traditional sources (government and philanthropic), Connecting Country is investigating alternative sources of income.

2024 - 2025


Income

Connecting Country continues to host a local Landcare Facilitator, funded by the Victorian Government, to support these groups with advice, networking, educational and capacity building opportunities.



Connecting Country's long-term monitoring program has focused on woodland bird and nestbox monitoring for now over 10 years. Bird monitoring is conducted twice annually (winter and spring) and nestboxes are checked every 2 years (last checked 2023-24).

Woodland bird monitoring continued in 2024-25 with our dedicated team of volunteers. The program could not succeed without these fantastic volunteers but life changes have meant some of our long-standing volunteers are moving on. New recruits have seamlessly joined the team but we hope to gain more to see the continued strength in the program. Long standing volunteer Jane Rusden has expressed her thoughts on her involvement in the program:

"I see it as an opportunity to assist the land owners to understand how important the improvement of habitat on their little piece of territory is to the environment in general and birds in particular. But also a wonderful chance to do some birding on private land that no other birders have access to."

Restoring landscapes



As funding for on-ground works becomes thinner on the ground for localised conservation work, Connecting Country seeks to adapt and diversify in finding new ways to support local landholders in implementing land restoration activities.

Thanks to funding from local business, Vegetation Link, we were able to source a cost-effective bulk purchase of tree seedlings from volunteer tree-growing organisation, TreeProject, to support landholders kick starting their restoration programs or incremental ongoing tree planting activities.

Our Habitat for Phascogales /Large Old Trees Project continued this year, cofunded by the lan and Shirley Norman Foundation and the Victorian Government Nature Fund, supporting installation of additional nest boxes across 10 properties, providing habitat for the threatened Brush-tailed Phascogale.

The Mount Alexander Region continues to attract new landholders and Connecting Country continually supports requests for advice from landholders seeking to improve and restore their land.

Partnership against Pests

In partnership with local Landcare groups, the Partnerships Against Pests project aimed to raise awareness of local pest plant and animal issues, and empower community with the skills to address these threats.

- Four stalls co-hosted with Landcare groups at local community markets
- Weed ID and Control Workshops
- Rabbit Control Field Day
- Cultural Walk with DJAARA
- Agricultural Chemical Skillset Course with Bendigo TAFE
- Monthly articles and promotion of pest and weed issues

This project was funded by the Victorian Government through the Partnership Against Pests program.









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Feathery Festival 2024

In recognition of National Threatened Species Day and to raise awareness of local woodland birds, many of which are threatened with extinction, Connecting Country partnered with Barkers Creek Landcare & Wildlife Group and BirdLife Castlemaine District to host a Feathery Festival from the 5-11 September 2024.

The festival included:

- Film screening of 'The Message of the Lyrebird' (Balangara Films) and panel discussion at Theatre Royal, Castlemaine.
- Guided bird walks led by Birdlife Castlemaine District at Rise and Shine Reserve, Newstead.
- 'Birds and Beers' conversation with Tanya Loos and Dr Anna Senior at Shedshaker Brewing Taproom.
- Radio segment on 'What's Golden' on MaineFM and other local media promotions
- Local bird t-shirt and tote design and sales by Castlemaine Birdlife









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Seeding our Future

Seeding Our Future project aimed to empower the local community to take direct action to increase flora populations across the region. Through the collection of seed and growing of indigenous plant species, particularly those that are rare, we can increase genetic diversity and population of local indigenous flora, creating resilient ecosystems and seed banks for our future.

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- Partnered with Seeding Victoria to deliver a Seed Collection Workshop. The workshop was fully subscribed and attracted a diversity of interested community members.
- In partnership with Newstead Natives, we held two Propagation Workshops, one for the Landcare and general community and one for First Nations Youth from Nalderun. Each participant went home with indigenous native plants and a propagation booklet for their future propagation projects.
- Overall the 3 workshops engaged 67 participants

Funded by the Victorian Government Landcare Grants through the North Central CMA with additional support from Cassinia Environmental and Natural Resource Conservation Trust

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Habitat for Phascogales/ Regenerate before it's too late

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♥TORIA

Raising awareness and conservation of the incredibly important large old tree heroes in our landscape and creating habitat stepping-stones for the Brush-tailed Phascogale, an important local marsupial threatened with extinction.

This is a 3 year project for on-ground works on private properties which has included:

- Protection of paddock trees from grazing pressures
- Revegetation, installation of nest boxes
- Creating habitat stepping stones across the landscape
- The development of engagement material and events

In year 3, we extended the project to deliver a further 30 nest boxes across 10 properties supported with land management advice.

Co-funded by the lan and Shirley Norman Foundation and the Victorian Government through the Nature Fund.



National Tree Day 2024

Celebrated 2024 National Tree Day with a community planting day at McKenzie Hill Old School Site on Sunday 27 July 2024.

- Partnered with McKenzie Hill Action & Landcare Group, Mount Alexander Shire Council and Rotary Castlemaine.
- 60+ community members of all ages attended the event and enjoyed a range of activities from planting to badge making, colouring and seed ball making.
- This event was made possible due to the generous contributions of Mount Alexander Shire Council, North Central CMA through the Victorian Landcare Grants and Rotary Castlemaine.
- The planting was part of The Bee-line pollinator corridors project, aimed at creating pollinator habitat across the region.









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Castlemaine Pride Rainbow Birdwalk



An inclusive bird walk for LGBTQIA+ locals to connect with birds, nature and each other in Castlemaine. In partnership with Castlemaine Pride, Birdlife Castlemaine we hosted our first Rainbow Birdwalk.

- 35+ queer bird lovers and allies on Dja Dja Wurrung Country.
- An inclusive introduction to bird watching techniques



- Vegetation assessments (habitat hectare methodology and other techniques to meet accounting for nature requirements).
- Fauna surveys (bird, reptile and frog surveys and use of motion-activated wildlife cameras).
- Ecological restoration advice.
